The Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District has state-owned land that it leases out to oil and gas companies. In 2015, the District decided to put those funds to work and build log cabins to rent at Pleasant Hill Lake Park. The park is comprised of 1345 scenic acres surrounding the popular lake. A natural setting for rustic log cabins. The District members visited the nearby Hochstetler log models and facilities, were duly impressed, and arranged a meeting to discuss their future plans. The 10 log cabins would be built among a stand of towering pines and would overlook the lake and be within walking distance of the beach and hiking trails.

#### **Log Homes are Safer**

Derle Schlabach and his wife Kay both woke one stormy night with a "loud bang" when a large tree blew over onto their new log home. One of the firemen said, "had they been sleeping in a conventional stick home, nothing would have stopped the tree from coming down on top of them!" Needless to say, he was thankful that his wife had insisted on building a log home! It may very well have saved both their lives!

Log homes with a post and beam loft and timbered roof system are stronger. In fact, a lot stronger. George Twiner feels as "snug-as-a-bug" and secure in his Hochstetler log home-even during a tornado. Living near Yazoo City Mississippi, he observed the destruction a rare twister, called a wedge, did to his community in 2010. His log home was barely scratched. However, his neighbors weren't so lucky. Many of the neighboring houses, including brick homes, were in ruin. The tornado claimed 10 lives and injured many more that were trapped in their collapsed homes.

# Log Home Advantage - continued from page 1 Our engineer who specializes in log & timber construction, Steve Lyki

Our engineer who specializes in log & timber construction, Steve Lykins, stated that, "Log walls are like a giant built-up beam (imagine an 8"thick x108"tall glulam beam!) with tremendous strength. An F-5 tornado (the highest-rated tornado) has wind speeds of up to 260 mph. That equates to about 173 lbs. per square foot of wind velocity pressure." He goes on to say, "According to my calculations the log wall in our McKay model with 8" thick logs fastened every 12 inches could withstand the effects of an F-5 tornado!" Goes to show why George's home is still standing!

Safety in a log home comes in various forms. Wildlife officer, Jim Kuenzle, was looking to build a home next to a state forest near St. Louis, MO. During the hunting season loads of hunters entered the woods surrounding the area where he wanted to build his house. He felt unsafe in a conventional stick home with all the stray bullets flying around. He knew as a wildlife officer that ½"drywall and OSB along with 3 1/2" fiberglass insulation wouldn't do much to slow down a riffled 12 ga. slug flying at 1560 feet per second. With the log home he and his family feel very safe behind their 8" thick logs. It's "literally" what a home should be, "a shelter."

#### Log Homes are more Cozy, Warm and Beautiful



There is no building material as beautiful, and, at the same time as warm, as wood. Steel, concrete or drywall doesn't even come close. And, no home has as much wood as a log home! I have been in large, multimillion-dollar homes, some even with timber, but I have yet to experience in these the charming coziness that you do when you're in a log home. Imagine yourself sitting next to a fireplace with a glass of fresh-pressed apple cider and eating a bowl of popcorn, while the flames dance in the reflection against the warm hue of the log wall, while playing checkers with your grandson, totally oblivious to the raging thunderstorm that's going on outside. You may want to sit down early as the rest of the family will want to gather there, too, and who knows, someone just might take your favorite chair! But you don't have to sit by the fireplace to experience the warmth of a log home, its everywhere. Simply-put there is no home as cozy and homey or inviting as a log home.

For Keith and Linda Gaspari, a log home was not in their plans until they happened to talk to a builder, W&W Construction, who highly recommended Hochstetler Log Homes for their quality and reputation. They decided to make their trip from Pennsylvania to tour the models, and to get acquainted with the company and staff. After perusing some of the customers' homes, they focused on one, but wanted to add some "lifestyle" changes, which the design team was able to make. They made the home wider, and instead of having a full-length, covered rear porch they made an 8'x14' covered deck off the master bedroom and another 7'x15' covered deck off the den. Upstairs, a V–Shaped extension adds a unique, decorative touch to the loft which overlooks the great room. The garage was enlarged to 20'x30' with a vaulted ceiling, which makes it seem even larger. Note: Very few of our stock house plans are built as the original but are modified to each individual's taste—we want each home to suit your lifestyle accordingly.

The Gaspari's purchased their land in 2015. It was originally a dairy farm but had been vacated for many years. Keith heard the subsequent owner was willing to

sell part of it, and bought 47 acres, with approximately 20 acres of it being wooded. Maples, Ash, Cherries, and towering 80' Oaks dotted the landscape. It was scenic, secluded, and full of wildlife. Deer, turkey, small game and several species of owls call this home. I spotted 6 deer in the short time I was there!

The 3,055 sq. ft. home was started in May, 2016 and finished a year later, delayed somewhat by a wet spring. The home has an Adirondack "appeal" with its large exposed timber entry and flanking gabled dormers. Add the stone – pillars across the front porch, the 8x8 D logs, and the standing seam metal roof and you

have a unique masterpiece of design. The interior is equally impressive with an eclectic collection of old and new items. Authentic Indian arrowheads are proudly displayed in a shadow box, along with an antique rocking horse, grandfather clock, "crank" telephone, hand – made baby cradle, and several western paintings. An old civil war musket, which Linda won at a raffle, hangs above the fireplace mantle. Caribou, Elk, Mule Deer, and Moose mounts enhance the rustic theme.

When asked what the most pleasant surprise was in living in a log home Keith replied, "They're very economical to heat and cool. And rock solid. They're Tanks."


Linda loves the feeling of being close to nature and has excellent views from the kitchen, with windows front and back of the house, as well as from the front porch and rear deck.

great rooms with large gas fireplaces, a 50" TV and Wi-Fi, vaulted ceilings; kitchens with all the cookware and appliances, two bedrooms and two baths, and hot tubs on the rear decks. The deluxe cabins also include washers and dryers and pull-out sofas in the loft upstairs. Two of the cabins are handicap-accessible and all have central air and heating.

The natural setting of the cabins really lend themselves to enjoying outdoor activities. There is the lake with boating, water-skiing, tubing and fishing; a nice beach; marina and boat ramp; numerous hiking trails; and nature programs for the children.

Another popular activity is canoeing on the Mohican river, about 5 miles away. Lots of ways to enjoy family time in the great outdoors!


Week-long reservations for the cabins are required in-season - June through August - and a two-night minimum is required during the off-season, September through May.


The four deluxe cabins can accommodate up to eight guests and run \$210 a night, Monday through Thursday; \$310 Friday, Saturday and Sunday; and \$1,350 for a full week.

The other six log cabins are smaller and can accommodate up to six. These cabins rent for \$175 Monday through Thursday; \$275 Friday, Saturday and Sunday; and \$1,175 for a full week.



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# CABIN FEVER

### "Magnificent Yellowstone!"

Among the most visited National Parks, Yellowstone stands alone in its rich variety of scenery as each bend in the road offers a wonder rarely seen. There are majestic waterfalls cascading down rocky gorges several hundred feet high; mountains reaching for the clouds in a panorama of colors from steel gray to copper; and glacial pools of vibrant turquoise and orange. It is truly God's country and was No.1 on our "Bucket List."

My wife, Sandy, and I first visited Yellowstone back in 2008. I remember driving on a mountain road and looking down a sheer cliff to a meandering, crystal clear river below, while searching for a pull off where I could capture this calendar photo. Suddenly, my wife screamed, "BUFFALO", as a huge 2,000 lb. bison approached us on the right berm and passed within 2' of her. She had no idea that bison lived there and certainly hadn't planned on seeing one up that close. To this day, she likes to yell, "BUFFALO", when we encounter any animal, large or small, on the road!

After our first trip we talked about a return trip and the opportunity came up last year when we went on a bus tour with my in-laws, Jim and Charlene, that encompassed Bryce Canyon, Zion, and Yellowstone National Parks. Each park has it's own awe-inspiring vistas, and the opportunities for great photo opportunities are endless. Bryce Canyon National Park is unique with its brilliant orange steeples, "Hoodoos", that rise magically out of the mountain sides, forming various rocky configurations and arches. The views are measured in miles, the colors in paint chips!



Next stop was Zion National Park with its beautiful combination of streams, mountains, and valleys. We were fortunate to see a family of endangered California condors on a steep cliff recess several hundred feet away with high-powered binoculars provided by the park service. The mountains here seemed to change color every 5 minutes as the sun arched its way across the sky...from cerulean blue to deep purple and all shades in between.

We stayed at the historic lodge while visiting Yellowstone. The lodge is a traditional log structure with a towering stone fireplace and a massive timbered, ceiling and is located only several hundred feet from "Old Faithful". This geyser erupts about every 35-120 minutes, spewing water up to 180 feet into the air. There are others that also erupt, but are not as regular and are generally smaller. Another sight to behold is the glacier basin. Walkways lead you through this labyrinth of colorful pools holding boiling water. Each year several visitors are boiled alive when they accidentally fall into these cauldrons of sizzling water. I couldn't believe the vivid colors of those pools. Minerals have formed to create a kaleidoscope of unbelievable hues...from bright turquoise to vivid orange.

One of my favorite pastimes while visiting the parks is photography, especially wildlife. And few places on earth host the variety of creatures that Yellowstone does. Elk, deer, bison, moose, bears, coyotes, wolves, beavers, wolverines, as well as many smaller critters roam its landscape. There are now about 94 wolves from the 14 originally introduced in January, 1995. The elk population is also healthy and flourishing. Nearly 6,000 make there yearly migration to the summer grazing areas and are followed by the wolves. Bison are also numerous and graze throughout the park, especially close to the lodge. While waiting in line for dinner one evening I spotted a mature male outside, a couple hundred yards away. I told Jim I'd be right back and rushed out the door, camera in hand. Once outside, I saw he was on the other side of a stream and actually closer to the trail which encircled the valley. I followed the trail but couldn't get much closer—and besides he decided to lay down. Somewhat dejected, I headed back to the lodge. As I rounded a bend I got the surprise I was looking for. A magnificent one-ton bull was peacefully grazing just off the trail ahead. I carefully went around him and watched him along with an elderly lady. I got a great shot with colorful trees and mountains in the background. Finally, the shot I'd been waiting for. Standing about 60' away, the lady asked, "Do you think we could outrun him if he charged?" My answer, "Nope!"







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
