Building a Good "Builder-Homeowner" Relationship (Continued from Summer 2022 Issue) - by Levi Hochstetler

#2 Disregarded nor followed the construction specifications.

The key is having a completed and through set of construction documents for the builder to follow. This is very important in assuring your home is built right. Your log home package manufacturer should provide you with professionally done construction documents (blue prints) and a comprehensive construction manual to supplement it, along with a material list. Make sure your

builder has at least two copies of the construction documents; one for the job site and one for the office and any additional copies he may need for his sub-contractors. Generally, one construction manual should suffice.

At our workshop, where we train builders on how to build a log home, we make the case that there is more than one right way to build a log home. However, our construction manual is a proven method that has

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

served us well in 100's of log homes built over many years throughout most of the US. Other methods may work and may even be better, but has it been tested? Also, be careful with warranty issues. Too many times we hear builders say, "this is how I have been doing it for 20 years and I have never had a problem." The problem with that thinking is, had there ever been the "once every hundred years" wet max snow load? As an example, recently a homeowner had icicles hanging along the inside of their gutter! Upon investigating we found that the builder was installing the ice and water shield and felt paper below the drip edge instead of on top of it. Along comes a big heavy snow and bingo, here come the icicles for the first time in any of the homes that builder has built - at least none that he was aware of. He had probably been doing it this way for many years and his grandfather may have taught him to do it this way and neither him, nor his grandfather before him, had ever run into any issues like this before!

Granted, all building practices are evolving. We, as a manufacturer for one, are constantly doing R&D looking for better ways to build and manufacture log homes. When we first started, we recommended builders to use large long spikes or nails to put the logs together using a sledge. Later, we used lag bolts and Oly-Log screws. Today we specify a screw that pulls the logs together tighter and is faster for the builder to use. All of these came with a more expensive price tag for the homeowner. Yet, we strongly feel each improvement was justifiable by having a better and easier to build log home. Had we kept our heads in the sand we may still today be sledging in one spike at a time saying, "that is how I have always been doing it and we have never had a problem with it!"

So, how can you, the potential homeowner, be assured your builder will follow the manufacturer's construction specifications? First of all, have it written in your contract with them that it is to be built per the manufacturer specification. If you're unfamiliar with basic construction techniques, hire a third party to oversee the project for you. This becomes more important when your county doesn't have a plan examiner or building inspector. We would recommend requiring them to attend the manufacturer's log builders workshop if they haven't built your manufacturer's log packages before. Most builders are happy to build according to the specifications, as this does in a way relieve them of some construction liability. Working directly with a reputable log home manufacturer can help as they will become your advocate in helping make sure that your home is built right.

#3 Weren't on the job all the time

I'm assuming this is implying that none of the builder's crews were working rather than saying that the owner was not there.

In general, unless you are building a multi-million dollar home, builders need to have several jobs under construction at any given time in order for them to be efficient. This is true even with a small one-crew builder. The reason is while the plumber is plumbing or the electrician is running lines, the builder needs to keep his people working on something else. Also, many builders want to have several projects in different stages in order to have some inside work available in case of inclement weather.

However, there may be such a thing as them planning a family vacation right in the middle of building your home. Understandably, you don't want to have the sub-floor exposed or the beams getting rained on while him and his family are out enjoying the seashore. Before you sign on the dotted line try to get an understanding as to what you can expect. Perhaps you ask that in the contract it states that starting from a certain date they will keep a crew of 4 men on your site 5 days a week until the home is dried in.

Generally speaking, the larger the contractor the more professional they are but then you probably won't see the owner much on your job site. However, the smaller the company is, the more you will see the owner on the site, but then he will be less professional otherwise. Builders come in many different shapes and forms. Some are strictly general contractors and sub everything out, while others do everything themselves including footers, electrical and drywall. However, most builders do all the log stacking, framing and installing windows with their own men; but then sub out specialty items such as pouring the footers, laying the blocks along with plumbing, electrical and HVAC. Understanding this and how they operate differently and which in turn effects their service, can help you in finding the right building solution with the involvement and level of service you want from the builder.



Step 5: Locating and arranging the home on the property; It's time to grab your survey and topography map, maybe a few stakes.


Step 6: Converting the bubble drawing to a scale sketch; Wandering around your property to find that "just right" spot for your dream log home was kind of fun and exciting.

Also, on site will be a vintage steam engine powered shingle mill cutting shingles (just like in the good ole' days!), as well as a sawmill cutting pine logs into timber and dimensional lumber.


Proceeds from the sale of refreshments and bake sale will benefit the Mohican Parochial School.

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Log & Timber Architectural Styles - By Steve D. Lykins, P.E.

(Continued from Summer 2022 Issue)

Mid Century Modern

This style is defined by the theory that 'form follows function' and that 'less is more'. While this style does not originate from log and timber construction, it is quite well suited to timber construction. Few types of structure better demonstrate the concept of 'form follows function' than a contemporary timber frame where the timbers are left exposed to show the form, allowing the function of the structure to dictate the aesthetic of the structure. While many traditional Mid Century Modern designs used steel for exposed structural elements, exposed wood elements can achieve the same effect while having less of a negative impact on the environment. Simple, sleek, linear, geometric forms often arranged with asymmetric balance define this particular style.



Farmhouse

Many Midwestern farms have a main residence that is simple in its form. While a traditional Midwest farmhouse was likely not constructed of logs or timbers, the contemporary interpretation of this style allows for use of logs and timbers. The farmhouse style is marked by simple, monotone or two-tone exteriors (white on white or black on white). A simple shed porch that wraps around the corners is a common stylistic element. Proportions are generally tall and skinny which provides for a more human-oriented form. This proportioning makes the style quite popular as it makes most folks feel comfortable and familiar with the form. While a traditional farmhouse was likely balloon-framed, using sawn lumber and sheathed with clapboard siding, a log wall is certainly appropriate to achieve this look. Also, the simple form and skinny proportions lend themselves nicely to a timber framed structure. The contrast between stark white masses and rich, golden-honey toned timbers left exposed provides a dramatic effect that many folks find pleasing.



Mountain

The Mountain log & timber home style is a bit difficult to define, but is usually identified by large, open spaces and massive logs or timbers used for walls and roof framing. The apparent large, awe-inspiring scale of the mountainous regions of the world, have no doubt, inspired this style. Large, steep gables, massive stone fire-places and chimneys and walls of glass to take in expansive views, are indications of this particular style. Often times, these elements are arranged in an asymmetrical composition, mimicking the forms in the unordered and dramatic pointed moun-

tain ranges that surround. This style is inspired also by the great lodges that have been designed and built in the mountain ranges of the world using the timeless native materials stone and wood. In the same way that a mountain dominates, yet remains part of its surrounding landscape, a Mountain style log & timber home also remains part of its environment while evoking a certain superiority.



Barn


The barn style of home is perhaps one of the strongest candidates for a timber home. As most traditional barns are timber framed, this style naturally lends itself to timber construction. Having come from western Europe, where timber framed barns and homes are the norm, many early American settlers chose to timber frame their barns simple because that is the knowledge and experience that they had. Long ago, many farmers did live in their barns with the livestock, so barn designs has evolved full circle, from a place to live and work, to a place to work and now, perhaps, back to a place to live. Anyone who is from or has visited the New England and upper Midwestern states knows that barns have a special nostalgia. It is no wonder that some folks want to experience that longing for the past every day by living in a home that is designed to look like a barn. There are several different traditional barn styles (i.e. bank barn, western barn, and saltbox) but any one of these styles would be marked by a simple, functional form often with a symmetrical arrangement. American barns are traditionally clad with vertical clapboard siding, metal roof panels or slate shingles and foundations are typically constructed of heavy stone. European barns often times are clad with brick or mud infill and some barns are constructed with log walls for their inherent strength, durability and insulating value. One common unifying feature of all barn styles is the large barn door, often with a cross buck added for strength and durability. If a building is made to look like a barn, it must have this feature to be authentic.



Conclusion

It is important to keep in mind that while most folks are inspired by a particular style or set of rules, it is most likely that they do not like everything about that particular style or set of rules. For example, part of the Farmhouse style is a balloon-framed structure of sawn timbers. There is an inherent fire danger with balloon-framing and it also requires long, straight pieces of timber that may be hard to source. It is uncommon to copy any particular style rule-for-rule because it is usually not desirable for one reason or another. The barn style is another example. A traditional barn is constructed without insulation, so it goes without saying that we would want to break this stylistic rule if we are designing a home to look like a barn. With this caveat, it is a fun exercise to try to establish a set of rules for any particular style and to make an effort to successfully design a home that exemplifies the style.

As Log and Timber Architecture regains popularity in America, it is likely that new vernaculars will be developed and some of those will become popular. Then a new style is born and will inspire future generations of log & timber enthusiasts.




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"Turtle Hill", the home of Marcus and Jamie Kelley, started with the idea of building a log home in the mountains of Tennessee, where they could bond with nature and really enjoy the relaxing benefits of the great outdoors. After going to Hochstetler's Log Cabin Days and attending Log Home University, they began their journey by looking at properties around Nashville. After exploring hundreds of sites, some barely navigable, they finally discovered a 10-acre wooded lot perched on Highland Rim, a mountaintop ridge about a mile and a half from the small town of Kingston Springs. It was heavily wooded with Oak, Hickory and a few Maple trees some towering 80-90' high, and inhabited by an abundance of wildlife: deer, fox, squirrels, coyotes, and ... turtles. In fact, there were so many Eastern Box turtles they named the property, "Turtle Hill." The property was even shaped like a turtle shell to boot!

A local realtor had suggested Hochstetler as a quality log home manufacturer and mentioned Ammon Miller as a builder. The Kelley's met with Levi Hochstetler and showed him their plans. After making several changes, Steve Lykins, Hochstetler's designer, began working on the preliminary plans. Joseph Hochstetler was also very involved in the building process and coordinated much of the project. They wanted their home to be rustic with an overall open-concept feel, so the great room featured huge hand-peeled rafters, sliding barn doors, and a majestic, 2-1/2 story stone fireplace with easy access to the kitchen and TV room. No hallways! The exterior featured a front deck with exposed timbers in the gable and a sofa and chairs to



relax. The rear included a full-length deck off the great room and master bedroom. A multitude of windows offered a great view of the outdoors from virtually every room. The cantilevered balcony over the great room had an office and offered a great view of the room below. The uniqueness of the home is also evident on the lower level where Marcus and Jamie replicated the rustic look of an old English pub by using leftover hand-peeled timber posts, stained glass windows, a corrugated metal ceiling and a beautiful mural of an old English pub on the wall. Guests have said this is their favorite room in the house since it makes them feel so relaxed and comfortable.

A former owner had put in a driveway to a building site atop the ridge many years before, but due to financial difficulties they were never able to build. Over the years trees and undergrowth had taken over so the drive was almost impassable and had to be cleared before construction could begin. Ammon Miller was called to layout the foundation and mark the footers. He did this in 20 minutes while another excavator had taken 3 hrs and still not gotten it right! They were quickly convinced that Ammon was the right choice as their builder. He was meticulous in details and so knowledgeable in building methods. Even Marcus, an experienced carpenter and craftsman, was impressed by his skills, given that he was only 27 years old.

The foundation for the 3 bedroom, 3 bath home was started in August, 2016 and finished on March 31, 2017. It truly was a "family affair." The Kelley's were the general contractors and did most of the interior work, including trim and hanging cabinets, while Ammon handled the major construction and made sure everything was according to code. Each was a perfectionist and ensured the process went smoothly and on schedule. The fact that their 4,000 sq.ft. home was completed in just 8 months is further proof of their efficiency.

At Thanksgiving, Marcus, Jamie, Ammon, his wife, Breanna, Ammon's crew, and friend and electrician, Richard, gathered 'round a make-shift table made of scrap wood held up by a Sky-Lift, and filled with all the "fixins" of a Thanksgiving dinner, to offer thanks and celebrate the culmination of a dream and a job well done.

"Why don't we use weal ones?", Aldon asked.


"These will work just fine", Edwin said, adroitly avoiding the question.


