Dream wish list: Whenever you see something you like in a magazine, tear it out or scan it for future reference. Keep them organized into categories such as: exterior ideas, kitchen ideas, great room ideas, etc. Remember to also gather landscape ideas and small details like electrical box covers, lighting fixtures, doors, windows, stain colors, flooring, faucets, and other items that catch your eye. Taking pictures when visiting friends or touring model homes can become a valuable source of ideas as well.

Keep these items in a handy, well organized file. Eventually, you will be showing your dream wish list to your designers. This can help them understand what you like, and in turn, incorporate your ideas into your plans. Otherwise, they may be guessing, wasting everyone's time.

Building Department: Contact your local building department (some areas don't have any) and find out what codes they follow, including energy codes. Be sure you ask what



your areas ground snow load is. It can greatly vary depending on elevation and location, sometimes within several miles. Get all their contact information as the designers may have further questions. This can save your designer tons of leg work later.

Meeting the designer: Load up all your sketches along with clippings, ideas, and pictures, and plan on a long meeting with your designer. I've had couples come in my office early mornings and end up being with me till late in the afternoon. Others take only a few hours. And remember, if there are two of you, both of you should sit down with the designer. Time spent now can save time later with phone calls and questions, etc. Do go with an open mind. The designer will have ideas from his experience and expertise that can greatly enhance your log home without adding cost. A good, competent designer can take the same material and arrange them in such a way as to make your home more attractive and enjoyable than a lesser experienced or talented person.

Share your budget: What do you want to spend on the project? This is important information that they need in order to get your home anywhere near your targeted budget. Otherwise, they will be like someone trying to hit a target blind-folded.

Concept drawings: First, you will want your designer to draw concept drawings for you to review. This is a very important necessary step.

If you did your homework well the designer should be able to get it on the first try, but don't be discouraged if he doesn't. With a few times back and forth, you should be able to have it your way.

Review the drawings: When you receive the final concept drawings back from the designer, you will want to do some serious reviewing. The best way to do that is to imagine each scenario of your home life and living habits something like this: Suppose visitors arrive. Will they find the door you want them to go to? They come to the door, and you welcome them. If they're friends you invite them in, take their jackets and you hang or lay them, where? You invite them to sit down. You offer them refreshments. You get it and serve. They ask to use the bathroom. You show them. You excuse yourself to prepare dinner. She offers to help. You graciously accept her offer;

Try to get the whole family involved in brainstorming like this. Ask yourself, who, what, where, when and how. SEE FIGURE A to the right.

Remember to keep everything in perspective. How often do you have visitors? How often do you come home from work? So, when there's a question between making a change to accommodate visitors that jeopardizes conveniences for you,

Each family has to think what's important to them. For our family, being avid birdwatchers, having a large window to watch a bird feeder becomes a high priority. Whereas the next family might spend a lot of time on the computer, so having an area where it's a bit darker becomes important. Spend a lot of time thinking about these things and you will have a lot less of the "if I ever build again" syndromes.

Also, cut out paper to imitate furniture sizes. Arrange them and make sure there's room to accommodate what you need. Be especially careful and make sure the inherited family heirloom pieces you cherish, fits. Once you've decided where things go you might glue them on your plans and do your "imagining living in the home" after you place the furniture.

Consider too, where you will put things. **SEE FIGURE B to the right.**

Mark all your changes in red so that the designer doesn't miss anything. After you are done with the exercise take or send the drawings back to the designer.

Other considerations: Avoid the temptation of having a well-meaning friend or cousin drawing up your log home. There's simply too much at stake. You don't want to leave your life-long dream log home in the hands of someone who may have drawn up a few conventional homes but doesn't thoroughly understand the construction of a log home. The techniques of building a log home are much different than that of a conventional stick home.

After the preliminary plans are done get a quote for the package and the construction of your home. With that information, secure the funds before you commit and pay for the final construction drawing. This could save you a lot of time and money in case it goes over your budget and/or per chance you couldn't obtain financing.



CABIN FEVER

"Rebirth of a River"

As an avid outdoorsman I've always been acutely aware and concerned about our natural resources and the condition of the land, lakes, and rivers we are leaving behind for our children. The remarkable rebirth of the Little Miami River, in southwestern Ohio, is an example of how a polluted river can become a sustainable, virtually pollution-free river in just a few years through the efforts of concerned citizens.

Glenn Thompson, the original director of the Little Miami Conservancy, saw an urgent need to save the river in 1967. "Someday, a corridor of green will stretch from one end of the river to the other," he said. "Individuals and families will enjoy peace and quiet and restoration of spirit that comes with clean water, birds, and trees." This vision is being forwarded by current director, Eric Partee. In the 1980's, only 4% of the river was in full attainment of water quality health, but in recent years, the chart has flipped, and as of 2007, the river is 96% attainment of health! Nowadays, on a typical summer weekend, hundreds of visitors enjoy the pristine river and the natural surroundings while hiking, canoeing, kayaking or fishing.

"As early as the turn of the century, this river was very well polluted. (There were) a lot of deformed fish, it was not anything close to exceptional," Partee said. But efforts to improve sewage treatment plants along the river in limiting phosphorus run-off paid off almost immediately.

To make sure the river stays healthy the conservancy has introduced YSI Water Quality Sondes, devices which monitor dissolved oxygen in nine locations throughout the 111 mile length of the river. Each system records oxygen levels every 15 minutes, allowing continuous awareness of water quality.

The conservancy also takes great pride in their work in forest restoration through buying riverfront properties, planting trees, removing invasive species, and working collectively in cleaning up trash along the shoreline. One couple, Mark and Robyn Bersani, owners of Loveland Canoe and Kayak Livery, have been volunteering each year in cleanups as well as making generous donations. This year, along with two other liveries, Rivers Edge and Scenic River, their combined donations to the conservancy amounted to \$56,000, according to Bersani. He continued, "It comes down to people that live along the river, people that visit the river, the people in the community ... if the river is to stay clean. This river is natural, it looks like it did 300 years ago ... it is vital that the citizens all realize they have a role in this."

Amy Aspenwall, an AP environmental science teacher at Loveland High School, was equally vociferous in teaching her students the importance of environmental awareness. "It's important for students to start to think of themselves as a bigger picture rather than someone following a teacher's instructions."

And to that I would like to add a concluding thought and one of my favorite quotes, "We all live downstream." And, we can all make a difference!
